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## EDITOR

**Lukasz Gruszczynski** is Associate Professor (Dr. habil.) of International Law in the Institute of Law Studies at the Polish Academy of Sciences (Warsaw, Poland) and External Research Fellow in the Institute for Legal Studies, Centre for Social Sciences, at the Hungarian Academy of Sciences (Budapest, Hungary). Professor Gruszczynski received his PhD from the European University Institute in Florence. In the past, Professor Gruszczynski has been a visiting fellow or lecturer at various foreign universities and research institutes, including, among others, the University of Michigan Law School, the Lauterpacht Centre for International Law at the University of Cambridge (as a Bohdan Winiarski Visiting Fellow), the Pázmány University (as an adjunct professor), the University of Zurich, the OSCE Academy in Bishkek, and the American University of Central Asia. In 2012 he received the Manfred Lachs Award for the best book by a Polish author in public international law.

Professor Gruszczynski is the author of more than 50 publications, many of them in respected international scientific journals or with leading publishing houses. His scientific portfolio contains four monographs, including two with Oxford University Press. His current research focuses on international trade law, international investment law, and risk regulation (in particular with respect to tobacco products and disruptive technologies). Professor Gruszczynski is a managing co-editor of the *Polish Yearbook of International Law* and correspondent editor of the *European Journal of Risk Regulation*.

## AUTHORS

**Allan M. Brandt** is the Amalie Moses Kass Professor of the History of Medicine and Professor of the History of Science at Harvard University. Professor Brandt served as Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences at Harvard University from 2008 to 2012. He is the author of numerous publications in leading historical and scientific journals. His book on the social and cultural history of cigarette smoking in the US, *The Cigarette Century: The Rise, Fall, and Deadly Persistence of the Product that Defined America*,

was published by Basic Books in 2007 (paperback in 2009). The book received the Bancroft Prize from Columbia University in 2008 and the Welch Medal from the American Association for the History of Medicine in 2011. Professor Brandt has been elected to the National Academy of Medicine and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. His work focuses on social and ethical aspects of health, disease, medical practices, and global health in the twentieth century.

**Marilyn Bromberg**, PhD, is Senior Lecturer at the University of Western Australia Law School. She is also a practicing lawyer. She received her PhD from Murdoch University (Australia). In the past she studied at the London School of Economics and York University (among others) and worked as a Senior Lecturer in the law school of the University of Notre Dame Australia (Fremantle Campus). Her research interests include e-cigarettes and the law, body image law, and energy drinks and the law. She has spoken about her research at conferences and courts around the world and has authored several publications in these fields.

**Giancarlo A. Ferro**, PhD, is Associate Professor of Constitutional Law in the Department of Law at the University of Catania. He earned his doctorate in constitutional justice and international protection from the University of Pisa. He is a member of the Italian Association of Constitutional Scholars. He has been visiting professor at the School of Italian Law of the University of Warsaw and has authored many publications dealing with forms of government, protection of fundamental rights, and constitutional justice in Europe. He has extensive experience in normative and regulatory issues regarding vaping (such as articles in *Therapeutic Advances in Chronic Disease* and the *International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Health*). This also includes cooperation with research group CoHEAR (Centro di ricerca per la riduzione del danno da fumo), University of Catania, coordinated by Professor Riccardo Polosa, a leading international scholar in the area of e-cigarette research.

**Marina Foltea**, PhD, is the founder and managing director of Trade Pacts, a trade and investment consultancy based in Geneva, Switzerland. She advises governments and private companies on international trade law and policy. Dr Foltea obtained her PhD in international economic law from the University of Bern, Switzerland. She was awarded the Walther Hug prize for the best legal dissertation in Switzerland and has published extensively in leading scientific journals in the field. Her thesis “International Organisations in the WTO Dispute Settlement: How Much Institutional Sensitivity?” culminated in a book published by Cambridge University Press in 2012. Her main areas of expertise are the linkages between trade and health, WTO dispute settlement,

market access, and trade negotiations. She also has extensive experience in the tobacco sector. In September 2016 she was placed on the Indicative List of WTO Panellists, making her eligible to resolve disputes between member states at the WTO.

**Coral Gartner**, PhD, is Associate Professor at the University of Queensland's School of Public Health (Australia) and a Theme Leader at the Queensland Alliance for Environmental Health Sciences. She is an editor for *Tobacco Control* and *PLoS Medicine*. Her research interests are tobacco control policy, nicotine and tobacco product regulation, tobacco harm reduction, health disparities, and monitoring community exposure via wastewater analysis. Associate Professor Gartner has authored numerous publications on tobacco control and tobacco harm reduction (including articles in *The Lancet*, *Tobacco Control*, *Nicotine and Tobacco Research*, and the *International Journal of Drug Policy*).

**Marie Elske C. Gispen**, PhD, is a postdoctoral researcher at the Department of Transboundary Legal Studies (Faculty of Law) at the University of Groningen (The Netherlands). Currently she is working together with Prof. dr. Brigit Toebes on a three-year research project, funded by the Dutch Cancer Society, on children's rights and tobacco control. She is a member of the Global Health Law Groningen Research Centre, a senior research associate of the International Centre on Human Rights and Drug Policy, and the coordinator of the recently established European Scientific Network on Law and Tobacco (ESNLT). She has broad expertise in health and human rights, with emphasis on tobacco control, drugs, medicine access, palliative care, empirical legal research, and links between bioethics and biolaw. Dr Gispen is the author or co-author of a number of publications in leading scientific journals and edited volumes. She also authored a monograph that was published in 2017 by Intersentia (*Human Rights and Drug Control*).

**Aleksandra Herbeć**, PhD, is a psychologist and mixed methods researcher specializing in public health, tobacco control, and behavior change. She graduated with an MSc in Health Psychology from University College London in 2012, and in 2016 trained as a Visiting Scholar at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston, USA. In 2019 she completed her PhD under the supervision of Professor Robert West and Dr Lion Shahab at the UCL Tobacco and Alcohol Research Group. She is also Programme Lead and Consultant at the Health Promotion Foundation led by Professor Witold Zatoński in Poland. To date, Dr Herbeć has worked on several projects involving the development and evaluation of complex digital smoking cessation interventions. She has also designed capacity building resources for healthcare professionals treating

patients who smoke, and conducted research on tobacco and e-cigarette use and medication adherence among general and patient populations.

**Patricia I. Kovacevic**, a Columbia Law School graduate, is an independent global legal and regulatory consultant. In the past she was General Counsel and Chief Compliance Officer for Nicopure Labs (USA), an independent producer of e-liquids. She has also held senior legal and compliance positions at various international tobacco companies. Her expertise includes US and global nicotine and cannabis regulation, commercial and corporate law, corporate affairs, internal investigations, antibribery, trade sanctions, privacy, and product development. Patricia serves on the board of the Global Tobacco & Nicotine Forum (a meeting point for tobacco and nicotine executives and specialists in public health, policy-making, and international relations), and has served on the board of directors of the US Vapor Technology Association. She is admitted to practice law in New York and before the Supreme Court of the United States of America.

**Ching-Fu Lin**, SJD, is Associate Professor of Law at National Tsing Hua University (NTHU), where he teaches international health law, food law and policy, and international law and global governance. Professor Lin received his LLM and SJD from Harvard Law School and holds a dual degree in law (LLB) and chemical engineering (BS) from National Taiwan University (NTU). His legal scholarship has appeared in numerous journals and edited collections, including the *Virginia Journal of International Law*, *University of Pennsylvania Journal of International Law*, *Columbia Science and Technology Law Review*, *Food and Drug Law Journal*, and the *Journal of World Trade*.

In addition, he served as Chief Editor of the *Asian Journal of WTO & International Health Law and Policy* in 2014. His legal scholarship has appeared in journals and edited collections, including the *Asian Journal of WTO & International Health Law and Policy*, *Contemporary Asia Arbitration Journal*, and *Global Arbitration Review*.

**Bryan Mercurio**, PhD, is Chair Professor, Associate Dean (Research), and Vice Chancellor's Outstanding Fellow of the Faculty of Law at the Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK). Professor Mercurio is co-author of one of the most widely used case books on WTO law (Hart Publishing, 2018,

3rd ed), and co-editor of the leading collection on bilateral and regional trade agreements (Cambridge University Press, 2016, 2nd ed). He also maintains an active trade and investment consultancy practice, working with governments to develop, negotiate, and implement free trade agreements. Prior to relocating to Hong Kong in 2007, Professor Mercurio taught in the faculty of law at the University of New South Wales and worked in private legal practice and government.

**Costanza Nicolosi** is a PhD in constitutional law and comparative constitutional law. She is also affiliated with CoHEAR (Centro di ricerca per la riduzione del danno da fumo) of the University of Catania. Costanza earned a BA and MSc in economics from Bocconi University and a JD from Northwestern University in Chicago. She has practiced law in the US, Belgium (Brussels), and Costa Rica. She has authored several publications dealing with EU law and comparative constitutional law.

**Anna Pudło**, PhD, is a research associate in the Faculty of Law at Koźmiński University in Warsaw (Poland) and a barrister in the Warsaw Bar Association. She graduated in law from the Silesian University in Katowice and holds a PhD in EU law from the Institute of Law Studies at the Polish Academy of Sciences in Warsaw. Dr Shahab's research spans a variety of techniques and methods, involving both human (randomized controlled trials, survey analysis, laboratory and experimental work) and animal studies (electrophysiology). He has collaborated with academic as well as non-academic (governmental and non-governmental) partners, and to date has authored more than 100 scientific papers, reviews, and reports.

He graduated with an MSc in Clinical Forensic Psychology from the Institute of Psychiatry, Psychology and Neuroscience (IoPPN), King's College London (KCL), in 2016. He is currently completing his PhD in Psychological and Behavioural Science in the Department of Behavioural Science and Health at UCL. In addition to his academic career, he has many years of experience working in a variety of mental healthcare settings, applying his expertise in psychology to develop and implement evidence-based treatment for patients with a range of mental health conditions.
